**Jason Swanson Peppermill Demonstration** 

ale, and has even been found up Pharaoh Ramses II's nose? Additional hint: Jason Swanson makes stunning mills to grind this herb. Right, it's pepper!

For anyone who hasn't yet met Jason, he's a newer Chicago Woodturners member, but no stranger to woodturning. At our March meeting, Jason gave us an excellent demonstration on construction of a segmented peppermill. Jason uses a staved blank method alternating contrasting woods to produce a striking peppermill that Julia Child would have been proud to own. Construction was detailed in 35 steps with the

aid of illustrated posters, prepared blanks, and unglued staves. The preparation of staves for these peppermills is a critical step. Jason explained the geometry involved as well as the use of a Wixey digital angle gauge for setting his table saw to a tolerance of one tenth of a degree. As a measure of Jason's success. Woodcraft had a run on Wixey gauges the very next day. Any potentially



was carefully explained. This included the glue used. an oddsized

Forstner bit, and finishing suggestions.

Jason continued his explanation and demonstration of the 35 steps until he presented a finished peppermill to his grateful audi-

### **Curls From the President's Platter**

At the March club meeting I brought to the gallery review two sea urchin Christmas ornaments. After the meeting several people came up and asked me about some of the details in making them. Thanks to those people, I have something to write about this month. This isn't easy trying to come up with an article every month.

Let me give you a few of the details I used to make them. One of the things that is often overlooked when attaching something to wood is that the coefficient of expansion of wood is much higher than most other materials and especially fragile ones, like glass or seashells. So instead of using a hard, rigid glue like CA, I looked at all of the glues at Menards to find something that would give a flexible bond to allow the wood to move without breaking the sea urchin. I settled on a product called "Power Poxy Stix-On Contact All Purpose Adhesive." I chose it for two reasons: first, it gives a flexible bond and second. by opening and closing the joint after you apply the glue, it creates a sticky bond which means you can hold it for 30 seconds and it bonds without clamping. An additional bonus is that it is thick enough to be gap-filling to accommodate the surface irregularities of the sea urchin.

Before bonding, I used a Foredom tool (a Dremel tool works just as well) with a cylindrical stone bit to make the holes in the sea urchin round. Then I turned the finials to match. But be gentle, since this is a fragile material. Bob Rosand recommends spraying the sea urchins with a lacquer to make them less fragile, but I didn't want to change the tactile feel of the piece, so I didn't do that. It may not affect it that much, so it's your choice. Good luck and take your time.

Another suggestion I made at the meeting, was how to cut grooves on the bottom of a bowl or vessel. I made a pyramid tool out of a 1/4" diameter drill rod. For those of you who are not familiar with this tool, it has a round shaft with 3 equally spaced flat surfaces

around the

circumference coming to a point at the tip of the tool. This creates a sharp edge at the intersection of the surfaces (I grind this angle to approxi-



mately 45°), which does a good job of cleanly scraping the wood on both sides of the cut when you

push it straight into the wood to create the groove. I used to use a skew chisel on its side this way, for the same reason. I think the pyramid tool works better, because it is narrower and sharp on both sides. It also works on cutting grooves on spindles. Give it a try; I think you'll like it.



In February, we announced a new column titled "Survey Says," and posed the question "what is your favorite finish for decorative bowls?" Response was small, but the comments interesting. The question caused Andy Kuby to take a closer look at his finishing techniques. That closer look led Andy to this book.

Box Flexner is an author, teacher and champion of "truth-inlabeling" for wood finishes After questions last month regarding finishing and my admission that I was totally winging it, I sought out the "Bible" of wood finishes, which has been recently updated: Understanding Wood Finishing by Bob Flexner, published by Reader's Digest, \$29.95. First issued in 1994, this is an excellent base course in the how and the <u>why</u> of wood finishes. The author has spent over 20 years running a woodworking and restoration shop, hosted a call-in radio show on finishes, made award-winning videos on furniture repair and restoration, taught finishing seminars and written over 300 wood-finishing articles in addition to being the editor of a professional restoration magazine and the author of the first edition of this book. He knows the territory.

A quick look at the table of contents shows the depth of coverage:

Each chapter includes multiple photos, charts, tips, sidebars (i.e. Making your own paste wax) and a continuing feature debunking common finishing myths. For instance, most "Tung Oil" finishes contain no tung oil, in fact tung oil by itself is a relatively inefficient and poor finish. Or, virtually any finish can be considered "food safe" once it is fully cured.

Once you understand a bit of the science behind the various finishes, which this book describes quite well, successful application becomes much easier. The book could not increase the amount of patience I have with curing times but it did tell me why I had to wait (and how long).

The information presented makes it possible for me to intelligently choose a finish to match the project and the intended use. More importantly, common finishing problems, and the solutions, are adequately covered, in text and photos. Diagnosing problems before the piece gets to the gallery table just got a lot easier, and the fix isn't always "start-over."

My shop has more unmarked, half-empty, skinned-over jars of finishes than I care to admit, all saved because I just might use them again. With what I'm learning I can get rid of them all and concentrate on what really works.

Now I just have to find a recycling center for the hazardous waste ....

This past month, a number of behindthe-scenes activities have been going on. While not terribly interesting on the surface, these tasks are essential to the success of the symposium.

I've been a four-state traveler, visiting turning and woodworking clubs to spread the gospel of Turn-On! Chicago. To enhance my presentations, I created a Power Point show to help illustrate the important elements of the symposium. Photos of the demonstrators and their work, pictures and maps of the St. Mary of the Lake campus, and other key points are included. The slide show will be running (thankfully without my narration) before the April meeting. It will be shown on our new DLP projector, a recent purchase by the symposium committee. This projector will be used at the symposium, and at our monthly club meetings and demonstrations. We had been borrowing an LCD projector from Duro-Chrome Industries, Don McCloskey's generous employer. I think you'll be pleased with the quality of the video at the meetings and demos. Wait till you see it at the symposium, twenty feet wide!

A simple contract for our demonstrators has been developed, using input from the AAW and pro demonstrators. Discussions with the demonstrators told us that they prefer to have all of the Chapter (or symposium) expectations in writing. These contracts will be mailed this coming week.

Contracts are also in the mail to Trade Show vendors. Bob Fernstrom has a great lineup of vendors, including tool and equipment vendors, and wood suppliers. Need a piece of Unobtainium burl? You're covered.

The TOC committee visited the St Mary of the Lake campus, planning such exciting projects as "how many chairs do we need, and how do we want them laid out in each room?" Boring, yes. Important, very much so. These are the details that make the event a pleasure for you to at

tend. We gave attention to such seemingly mundane issues as: extension cords, work lights, attendee traffic patterns, wheel chair access, even the width of the elevator door. Details? How many men's room vs. lady's room stalls are there? How many will become, well, *unisex\*?* We're trying to think of everything, and everything makes for a big list.

The committee is comprised of a hard-working, thoughtful group, with everyone working towards a common goal of a successful symposium. ### Are you ready for a real challenge?

### **Friends of Phil Brennion**

Former AAW President Phil Brennion is an inspiration to many in the woodturning world.

You may know Phil from his five years as an AAW board member and two years as AAW president. Or as the accomplished turner and teacher from Arizona. Maybe as a co-owner of Van Gogh's Ear, a crafts gallery in Prescott. Or from one of his sparkling articles in American Woodturner or WOOD magazine.

One thing for sure: If you know Phil, you know a person who makes the most of each day, and you have been inspired by his determination. Phil's mobility challenges began in 1982 with an ill-performed chiropractic procedure. Phil has since endured eight surgeries on his neck and hips. A ninth surgery in 2007 brought Phil to life's edge. A surgical team performed an emergency 10-hour procedure to de-tether his spinal cord. Following this surgery, Phil was paralyzed from the neck down. He then spent 107 days in the hospital.

Now at home, he spends nine hours a week with therapists to regain movement. Because he is a quadriplegic, Phil uses a high-tech wheelchair that he steers with his head via sensory pads. Phil and his family are optimistic From the AAW website

that he will regain movement in his hands and legs with time (doctors say it can take up to two years). In recent weeks, Phil has had occasional mobility in his left arm and sporadic movement in both feet, which is encouraging. In spite of healthcare insurance, the uncovered medical and therapy expenses have exhausted the Bren-

nion finances. For example, by the end of May, Phil will have depleted the therapy allotments for 2008. To help meet expenses not covered by insurance, a "Friends of Phil" checking account has been set up. Please do what you can to help a fellow woodturner.



### **A Closer Look**

An examination of the art, the turner, and the techniques of a fine turning

This is one of two vases Jerry has made. The first one was for his wife, Carol. This example has been generously donated to the Turn-On! Chicago 2008 Symposium auction.

Starting with a 12" disc of maple, Jerry sawed it through the center, and after hollowing the inside, glued the two halves back together to finish-turn the outside profile. Jerry says there is more money and labor in the ebony stand than in the vase itself. The stand is hand-carved to allow the bottom of the vase to protrude through the stand.

The Chicago skyline is a favorite view for the Howard family, and was laser engraved by The Finer Line in Schaumburg.

Credit is due Jerry's daughter-in-law, Karin, for the flower arrangement that completes a fine example of art, turning and imagination.

### **Proposed Revised CWT By-Laws**

#### I. Organization

Chicago Woodturners (CWT) is a not-for-profit club organized to promote and encourage interest and education in the art and craft of woodturning.

#### II. Membership

Membership is open to anyone wishing to increase his or her skill levels and knowledge through education, discussion and critique. There shall be an annual membership fee as determined by the Board of Directors. While not a requirement for membership in the CWT, membership in the American Association of Woodturners is strongly encouraged.

### III. Affiliation

The CWT is an affiliate chapter of the American Association of Woodturners.

#### **IV. Meetings**

The CWT shall meet monthly on a day, time and place as established by the membership. The schedule of the meeting dates, times and locations shall be published in the club newsletter and on the club website.

#### V. Ouorum

Inasmuch as the CWT shall conduct its business at these meetings, those in attendance shall constitute a quorum. A simple majority of the quorum shall be required to pass on all business issues.

#### VI. Governance

The CWT members shall elect a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer. Details of the election process are given in Article VII. The CWT shall be governed by a Board of Directors, comprised of the elected officers and the most recent past president. The CWT Board of Directors tors shall meet at least quarterly, or more often if required, at a day, time and place as established by the Board. Members of the Board should receive at least two weeks advanced notice for all quarterly board meetings.

All members of the Board must be members in good standing in the Chicago Woodturners and the American Association of Woodturners.

The Board of Directors shall be empowered to act on behalf of the CWT at those times when the general membership is not in session. A majority of the Board members must be present to create a quorum and a majority of this quorum is needed to pass any issue brought to a vote.

### VII. Elections

The officers shall be elected for a period of two (2) years. The term shall begin on the 1st of the calendar year and shall continue until December 31st of the second subsequent year. Nominations for upcoming vacant positions on the Board of Directors will be held in October. Selected candidates shall provide an article outlining their background and objectives for the CWT that will be published in the November issue of the newsletter. Elections shall take place at the December meeting by secret ballot or in the case where there is a single candidate for that office, by a voice vote or a show of hands.

In order to facilitate an orderly transition and to preclude a mass change of leadership, two (2) positions shall be elected every year. The President and Secretary shall be elected for a two (2) year term starting on the even years. The Vice-President and Treasurer shall be elected for a two (2) year term starting on the odd years.

An officer may succeed to that elected position for no more than three (3) consecutive two (2) year terms.

#### VIII. Officers and Responsibilities

Listed below are the elected officers and their duties and responsibilities.

President: The President shall be the principal executive officer of the club. His or her duties and responsibilities include organizing and conducting all club and Board of Directors meetings, managing and supervising all business transactions and assigning additional responsibilities or duties to other Board members as needed.

Vice-President: In the absence of the President or in the event of his or her death or inability, or availability to act, the Vice-President shall perform the duties of the President. When so acting, the Vice-President shall have all the powers of and be subject to all the restrictions upon the President. In addition, the Vice-President shall be responsible for obtaining gallery reviewers and in-house demonstrators for the monthly club meetings. The Vice-President shall also perform such other duties as from time to time may be assigned to him or her by the President.

Secretary: The Secretary shall keep the minutes of the club and the Board of Directors meetings in one or more books provided for that purpose and see that these minutes and all other notices are duly published in the CWT newsletter. In general, the Secretary shall perform all duties incident to the office of Secretary and such other duties as from time to time may be assigned to him or her by the President. In addition, the Secretary shall maintain the "Policies and Procedures" handbook as defined in Article XI of this document.

Treasurer: The treasurer shall collect all membership fees from the Membership Chairman and all other monies belonging to the club. He or she will be responsible for keeping current and accurate records of all monies and provide adequate records for a tax consultant to file annual tax returns. The Treasurer shall keep such funds as may accumulate in a recognized legal banking facility.

The Treasurer shall provide a monthly summary report to the membership on the state of the finances of CWT and a detailed financial report to the Board of Directors at the quarterly meetings. In general, the Treasurer shall perform all duties incident to the office of Treasurer and such other duties as from time to time may be assigned to him or her by the President. The Treasurer shall serve without bond.

#### IX. Removal from Office

Any officer, elected or appointed, may be proposed to be removed from office by the Board of Directors when it is deemed that it would be in the best interests of CWT. This would be accomplished by a two thirds (2/3) majority secret vote of the Board of Directors, followed by a two thirds (2/3) majority secret vote of the CWT members at a regular monthly meeting. Prior notice of the club vote must be given at least two weeks in advance of the meeting. Such action shall be without appeal.

Any elected officer can resign his or her position by giving two weeks written notice either in letter form or e-mail to the President.

### X. Vacancies

A vacancy in an elected office because of death or resignation may be filled by the Board for the remaining portion of the term.

A vacancy due to removal from office must be filled for the remaining portion of the term by a majority vote of the members present at a regularly scheduled meeting. Prior notice of this vote must be given at least two weeks in advance of the meeting.

Note that Article XIII has been modified since last month's publication to require the signatures of two board members for any check written.

#### XI. Policies and Procedures

As the need arises, policies and procedures may be written, voted upon and approved by the Board to define and document the detailed workings of the club. This handbook will provide a more flexible supplement to the by-laws. In the case of a discrepancy between the by-laws and the "Policies and Procedures" handbook, the by-laws shall take precedence. The "Policies and Procedures" handbook shall be maintained by the secretary and may be revised or added to as necessary by the Board.

#### XII. Other Positions and Responsibilities

Other key club positions shall be filled through appointment by the Board. The term of these appointments shall be two (2) years, renewable at the discretion of the Board. The Board also has the authority to replace appointees at any time, when it is deemed in the best interest of the club.

Since the members in these positions contribute a significant amount of time and energy to supporting the club and have a good insight as to the feelings of other club members, they shall attend the board meetings to provide their opinions on the topics under discussion. If there is a survey on an issue that will be voted on by e-mail, in place of an actual board meeting, the volunteers will be solicited as well.

These positions include, but are not limited to: Newspaper Editor, Membership Chairperson, Librarian, Tool Custodian, Demonstration Planner, Raffle Chairperson, Video/Audio Technician, Cleanup Chairperson and Webmaster. Description of their responsibilities is defined in the supplemental "Policies and Procedures" handbook described in Article XI.

#### XIII. Expenditures

Expenditures greater than \$100, but less than or equal to \$1000, require the approval by a majority vote of the Board of Directors or a majority vote of the members attending a regularly scheduled club meeting.

Expenditures in excess of \$1000 shall require a majority vote of the Board of Directors, followed by a majority vote of the members attending a regularly scheduled club meeting. Prior notice of this vote must be given at least two weeks in advance of the meeting.

Checks over \$100 will require the signature of the President and one other board member. Checks for less than \$100 will require the approval and signature of any two board members.

#### XIV. Dissolution

The CWT may be dissolved by a two-thirds (2/3)-majority vote of the membership attending a regular meeting. Prior notice of this vote must be given at least two weeks in advance of the meeting. In the event of dissolution, the Board of Directors shall, after paying or making provisions for payment of all CWT liabilities, dispose of the remaining assets in the following manner.

- A committee of the CWT, appointed by the Board, shall be established to determine the sales value of the property of the CWT.
- Values established by this ad hoc committee will be final and binding.
- Members of the CWT shall have the right of first refusal. If there is more than one buyer interested in an item, the successful buyer will be determined by a silent auction.
- Subsequent sale of CWT property shall be to the general public.
- The proceeds from these sales shall be divided equally amount each of the current members. Current membership will be those members who are members in good standing when the dissolution vote was approved.

#### XV. Amendments

These By-Laws may be amended at any time by a two-thirds (2/3) majority of the members attending the meeting when the vote is taken. An announcement that proposed changes to the by-laws are pending shall be made two weeks prior to the meeting. Such proposed changes shall be presented and voted upon at the next regular monthly meeting. Adopted amendments shall take effect on the first of the month subsequent to the meeting at which the vote was taken.

A copy of the amended By-Laws must be filed with the national office of The American Association of Woodturners when approved.
