

Turners of every level should avail themselves of this demo and classes. Get a grip on the skew, and learn to turn efficiently and with style.



Curls From the President's Platter

Those of you who have been attending our club meetings or have been reading the newsletter know that the Chicago Woodturners tied for first place with the Montgomery County Woodturners of Bethesda, MD in the Annual AAW Newsletter Competition.

The judges rated each newsletter on a 10 point scale in six categories. Each of these categories was given equal weighting.

The categories were:

- Visually appealing layout/graphics design.
- Providing up-to-date information.
- Uniqueness and personality, with a blend of design and woodturning appeal.
- Contribution to the AAW's charter to promote education in woodturning.
- Content that contains useful technical and news-related information.
- Writing skills which demonstrate easy to understand, lively, and inviting articles.

Winning this award was no small feat since there are 309 chapters of AAW. During the AAW Symposium a plaque was accepted by Paul Shotola on behalf of the club. In addition, this award was acknowledged in the *American Woodturner* Journal.

Receiving this award has not been a surprise to me and should not have been a surprise to any of our members, considering the quality of our newsletter and talent and dedication of its editor and his staff. A large part of the success of our newsletter is due to the artistic talent of Paul and his ability to motivate and inspire other people to do the necessary writing every month. 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In addition to the EOG program, the AAW also has Fellowship Grants for professional (and those aspiring to become professional) turners through the Professional Outreach Program (POP). Grants are available to **AAW** members to encourage creative growth, research, or provide inspiration for new directions in turned wood art. An applicant might be interested in pushing their work creatively in another direction, or they might be interested in a topic for written research, or for influence of a new direction in their work.

AAW News and Updates

At the July meeting, Binh Pho told us about the **Educational Opportunity** Grant (EOG) auction at the national symposium and the nearly \$63,000 in EOG donations that resulted. Have you ever wondered how those funds are used or how you can apply? Well, let's take the mystery out this benefit to AAW members. EOG funds can be applied for by all AAW members as well as AAW affiliated chapters. schools, students, and other organizations. The goal of the EOG is to promote education in woodturning by providing educational opportunities that expand and enrich the entire woodturning community, providing ways for these skills to be shared, and creating opportunities for members who would otherwise not be financially able. Schools and students do not have to be associated with the AAW but the funds must be used to enhance the educational mission of the AAW.

According to EOG chairman, Malcolm Tibbetts, there are no specific characteristics that the committee uses in evaluating applications other than a strong educational element. Each year

applications are reviewed by the AAW's EOG committee appointed by the board of directors. Each committee member rates applications on a 7 point scale and those with the highest combined total are evaluated further to

are evaluated further to select the recipients and determine the amount of the award which can be up to \$1000 for individuals and \$1500 for organizations. Applications are being accepted until January 15, 2010 and

awards will be announced by March 1, 2010. If you are interested in

(www.woodturner.org) along with more details on the program and application process. If you are looking for financial

assistance for a project or class that will be used to promote woodturning education, the EOG can be a great funding opportunity for you to pursue. Good Luck!

Stephen's specialty is inlaying mineral crystals into turned artwork. Stephen tells us: "For several decades I was an avid mountaineer in the Pacific Northwest. Passing through gnarled trees on an approach, finding holds in crystalline rock, and being immersed in the constantly changing weather were aweinspiring experiences. In 1998, seeking relief from the pressures of my electronics career, I first tried woodturning and stone carving. These disparate materials were soon merged as I developed techniques to create imagery from

my mountaineering experiences in
wood turned objects
with mineral crystal
inlay. An interest in
Japanese art and
Buddhist poetry influenced the designs as
my technical skills developed.

I now strive to conceive and create pieces that reach out and connect with others - works to stir the viewer's memory and evoke a moment in time."



Bill Brown Forging Demo July Meeting



Consider the art and skill of blacksmithing. The world had an early appreciation of blacksmithing since armies with bronze weapons regularly got their keisters handed to them by armies with iron weapons. During July's meeting, Bill Brown gave CWT members an appreciation of blacksmithing. Bill's woodturnings are wonderful creations in their own right. What sets them apart are his own artistically forged display stands. The hand-forged steel stands invoke an air of mystery and lore unavailable to those who are not blacksmiths. To this day, there are still weddings performed over an anvil. While some of our significant others have suggested that we just marry our lathes, I don't think

lathes are used in any wedding ceremonies....yet.

Bill has mastered flame and steel with a homemade propane forge constructed of a boiler expansion tank, fire brick, and pipe fittings. The forge has a tool rest at the front and has tremendous utility given its size. Among his other tools are an anvil, tongs, chisels, pliers, and a bucket of water. Bill wields a two pound German cross-peen hammer as he emphasizes the importance of speed and precision over brute force. It's also important to keep both the anvil and hammer dressed. Any imperfection in either is transferred to the work piece.

Time works against the blacksmith. He has only has about 15 or 20 seconds to work the steel before it's

too cool to be malleable. At that point, it's back to the forge to reheat to 1800 degrees.

The grateful audience learned how to

read the steel's color, make square stock round, scroll on the anvil's horn, make twists, elongate and point steel, temper, and avoid any embarrassing "Three Stooges" moments.

By the end of his demonstration, Bill had forged a stunning fireplace poker out of one quarter inch mild steel stock.

It's worth noting that a blacksmith (Tom Joyce of New Mexico) was asked to give the keynote speech at the AAW 2009 Symposium opening ceremonies. It was evident to 1300 attendees that a blacksmith can truly be an inspiration to woodturners. Our own Bill Brown's demonstration served as a ringing Amen. Thanks, Bill. We will (ahem) forge our way to perfection with your hot new techniques.

We'll bring you updates on the planning of our symposium, Turn-On! Chicago 2010. A finalized list of demonstrators will **Paul Shotola**


be announced, along with details on events planned for August 20-22, 2010.

Lathes for Sale Don McCloskey

The CWT, as part of our continuing program to upgrade the class-room lathes, is offering three lathes for sale at auction. Our long-term goal is to have all lathes identical Jet 1642 models. We currently have three Jets, with plans to purchase at least two additional lathes.

The auction will end on September 8th at 8:00 pm. Each lathe has a minimum bid (as of this writing, a minimum bid has been placed for each lathe) and a "Buy it Now" price. Bidding is open exclusively to CWT members until August 15th, when it will be open to the general public. At that time, advertising will be sent to the various turning and woodworking clubs in the area.

The lathes offered are all in excellent condition, and have very little use. All include the standard factory accessories (toolrest, faceplate, live center, etc.) and all are on factory stands.

Delta 46-765, 16" swing, 42" length. 220 Volt, electronic variable speed. Electronics recently upgraded. Stand includes factory caster set. 1 1/4" X 8 spindle, #2MT tapers. Minimum bid: \$500. Buy it Now: \$1100.

Hugh Pearl Onyx Pen

That's Onyx the stone, not onyxlooking acrylic. The subtleties of the stone really shine on this well-made pen. Hugh discovered that onyx can be drilled with regular drill bits, but turning the outside is tough on standard turning tools. He used a tool called the Easy Rougher, which has a carbide disc as the cutting edge.

I like to see the limits the lathe expanded, and Hugh has certainly done that with this pen.

A Closer Look Paul Shotola

Roy Lindley conducted our Gallery Review in July. Although the table was overflowing with fine work, Roy felt that Clint Steven's "Sphere Emerging from a Rectangle" deserved a closer look.



Clint discovered this unique turning at the 2009 AAW Symposium. It was demonstrated by a young French turner, Pascal Oudet.

The project is turned on 3 axis, and requires a bit of

hand work to finish the area closest to the rectangle.

This is a genuinely challenging piece to make, as every step must be performed in the correct order, and there is no way to go

back and re-do a step. We applaud Clint for taking on the challenge, especially after seeing it demonstrated one time. Oudet did provide a hand out, and we're checking to see if that handout can be reprinted for our members.

If you're burned out on bowls, try something different. You will never learn the depth of your abilities until you tackle something out of your comfort zone, as Clint has done here.
