

It was pointed out that learning to turn a sphere is beneficial to turning bowls, toruses and of course beads and coves.

The Gallery Review was done by Frank Pagura, which included a variety of items, from small pendants, boxes, large bowls and wall hangings.

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Meet the Turner | Brenda Miotke



Paul Pyrcik

Paul Pyrcik was born in Chicago, Illinois and grew up on the city's northwest side. He graduated from both Lane Technical H.S. and DePaul University where he majored in business/accounting.

During his 40-year working career, Paul held key management and leadership roles in the fields of internal audit/finance, community relations, and

development/fundraising at Waste Management, Inc., Central DuPage Hospital (Northwestern Medicine), and Benet Academy. He retired in 2019.

For decades, Paul has also served the community in volunteer and board leadership roles. Most significantly at Metropolitan Family Services – DuPage, United Way of Suburban Chicago, Junior Achievement – DuPage, and the Boy Scouts of America – Three Fires Council.

Paul's interest in working with wood began in grade school while attending an after-school woodworking program hosted by the Chicago Park District and continuing throughout his high school shop classes. He fully embraced the hobby of woodturning - and invested in a lathe and tools – in 1997 when he turned 40 years old and attended an annual Woodworkers Show at the Odeum in Villa Park. He has now been a woodturner and active member of the Chicago Woodturners for more than 25 years (and can often been seen selling raffle tickets at our monthly meetings!) He is also a long-time member (and past president) of Windy City Woodturners (Naperville), American Association of Woodturners (AAW), Ornamental Turners Int'l. (OTI), and the DuPage Woodworkers.

A strong proponent of life-long learning and sharing, Paul has attended annual national AAW woodturning symposiums, participated in numerous hands-on, intensive artist workshops, played a key role in establishing the Turn-On Chicago live fundraising auction that continues to this day, has attended the Ohio Valley Woodturning Symposium, and has twice served as workshop assistant for Dick Sing at the John C. Campbell Folk School. Paul is currently a partner in the Fox Valley Gallery of Wood and is a featured demonstrator at this year's Midwest Penturners Gathering where he shares his current exploration of a range of texturing tools on small turned wood items.

Paul credits local turning masters Ed Szakonyi and Dick Sing with being two of his earliest major influences. He also places Hans Weissflog, Jacques Vesery, Mike Mahoney, and Nick Agar at the top of his long list of contemporary professional influencers. He acknowledges them for helping to ignite an

awareness of the importance of precision, passion, and creativity in his work. Today, Paul enjoys creating a wide variety of both utilitarian and artistic items. He is a featured local demonstrator and a sought-after turning instructor.

Paul describes his shop space as "organized chaos." Over the years he has acquired enough machinery, tools, and wood to fully equip two complete basement shops – one here in Illinois and a second at his lake house in Northern Wisconsin. He has a sizable collection of lathes including an original Powermatic 3520, a new Powermatic 2014, several Jet and Vicmarc mini lathes, a Bonnie Klein lathe, a Unimat lathe, and an MDF Rose Engine lathe. All occupy special places in his shops and his heart!

In addition to woodturning, Paul enjoys spending time with his family, bass fishing, kayaking, riding BMW motorcycles, and exploring the Northwoods of Wisconsin. He and his wife Robin are 35+ year residents of Lisle, IL, have two adult children, and recently became first-time grandparents.

I thoroughly enjoyed my conversation with Paul ... and it was a lot of fun to "Meet the Turner!"

When Michelangelo was asked how he created the statue of David, he said "You chip away everything

that doesn't look like David." Whether you get a baseball sized sphere or a ping pong ball depends on how good you are!



Frank's demo provides a

more structured approach that allows him to achieve a desired diameter with less guesswork. It's his background as a machinist on a metal lathe that influences much of his wood turning methods...

Frank envisions a sphere inside a polygon. Figures 1 through 3 shows an enclosed sphere, and how more sides come closer to approximating a sphere. An octagon, an 8 sided polygon, comes close, and a sixteen sided polygon (also known as a hexadecagon) comes even closer.

In a nutshell, by turning a planar octagon enclosing a circle on the lathe, you will create a 3D solid that encloses a sphere.

Frank starts with a longer turning block that is the target diameter plus a quarter inch. He selects a longer blank in anticipation of creating a jam

chuck for a later stage.

He marks off a taper so that he can switch to a Vicmarc chuck.




A block is turned into a cylinder. This diameter is

used to determine the length of the sides of an octagon.

Frank uses this formula:

Diameter x Pi = Circumference $3.125 \times 3.14 = 9.812$ Circumference / 8 = length of side

9.812/8 = 1.216



Frank turns Side B (Fig B) on the end of the cylinder. He then marks off the diameter along the length of the cylinder (Fig C), determines a centerline and marks the length of Side A equidistant on the centerline (Fig D).

Next, Frank provides a little more room on the headstock end, and begins to turn a flat between the Side A and Side B.

The space between Side A and Side B is now shaped as half of the sphere. (Fig E & F) Repeat on the other side of the cylinder to complete the sphere. (Fig. G)

The sphere is parted off (Fig G).in preparation for fine tuning the sphere between jam chucks (Fig H

Frank had preplanned the creation of jam chuck on the headstock side. On the tailstock side, Frank has creatively uses the rubber tip off a crutch on the tailstock! (Fig G and H)

Using the jam chucks the sphere the nubs can be removed. The sphere can be repositioned successively to finalize the sphere's shape. Sanding and applying the final finish can also be done at this point.

Frank's demo hits a number of points in turning a sphere.

Frank believes it's a important skill to be able to intentionally turn on a lathe and stay within the confines that you initially set up for your turning.

The approach that Frank uses is really useful when your goal is a sphere of a desired diameter vs the Michelangelo approach. Frank turns 25 baseballs at a time, an in doing so, builds a lot of muscle memory for turning spheres.

The process helps a turner develop a set of with a variety of different tools as well as a trained eye for shape and proportion. Frank believes that turning a bowl is really turning two spheres, one inside the other, so the technique carries over.

Using this approach but creating an enclosing polygon of sixteen sides provides an even closer approximation of a sphere to work from (Fig 3)

Yes, there are mechanical jigs that can simplify the process, but as Rich Nye mentioned to me at MPG, where's the craftsmanship in using a jig?

So thanks to a seasoned craftsman for showing us his approach to turning a sphere!

I learned so much about turning a sphere in reporting on this demo. It was from not only Frank's demo, but the discussions with other turners like Clint Stevens, Rich Nye, John Dillon and Dick Sing at MPG as well as surfing the web, looking at the AAW forums and also YouTube. Every turner has a unique take on turning a sphere, from Hans Weisflog to Kip Christiansen to Dick Sing. Not only does practice make perfect, but also there's a rich body of knowledge in sphere turning techniques! And that's only for a sphere from a single piece of wood!

CWT Safety | Frank Pagura

Concentrating on simple things go a long way in helping us to develop safe habits while working with table and band saws. Dave Bertaud is contributing push sticks which he made in quantity. Some of these sticks will be available at the monthly meetings as door prizes. Thank you Dave!

This is to foster good working procedures when feeding lumber through a fence and an unforgiving spinning blade.

It is always a good plan to be prepared with useful push sticks when getting ready to saw wood. These sticks protect hands while allowing good control of wood being handled.

Make it a habit to have push sticks conveniently placed around your saws, so you don't have to look for one.

HANG THEM, VELCRO THEM, RARE MAGNET THEM close at hand. Then every time you see blade marks on your push sticks......SMILE, and replace them as soon as they are no longer effective.

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A Message from TOC | Al Miotke & Kurt Wolff-Klammer



Turn-On! Chicago is coming soon. I am guessing that many members of the Chicago Woodturners have never had the opportunity to attend a woodturning symposium and may not understand what it is all about. As organizers of the event, it is easy to assume that

everyone realizes the benefits of attending. Over the years, I have heard many times that somebody is not attending because they are not a good enough turner for this type of event. That comment could not be further from the truth.

First, what is a woodturning symposium? It is typically a weekend event with well known educators demonstrating a variety of woodturning related techniques in a series of 90-minute classes. At Turn-On! Chicago there will be 5 separate classrooms going all day long for 2 ½ days. That is 10 separate rotations where you can select between 5 different demonstrations to attend. As an attendee, you decide what you want to see during each rotation. There is no need to sign up for an individual class, just walk into the classroom that is of most interest to you. In each time period, there will be topics of

interest to turners of all interests and skill levels taught by professional turners and educators. Topics will include Basic Bowl turning and spindle turning, how to efficiently use turning tools, watching experts show how to make some unique projects, learn a variety of carving and embellishment techniques, painting techniques, and much more. After attending a symposium, attendees are always overwhelmed with new knowledge and anxious to try the new techniques they have learned. This happens no matter how many symposiums you have attended.

But there is more, starting with a tradeshow where you can see products from a variety of suppliers to the woodturning community. You can talk to the company owners about the products. Quite often there are show specials and there are no shipping costs. After attending the tradeshow, walk into the instant gallery. A large room where every attendee is encouraged to bring in up to 3 pieces to put on display. The demonstrators will also have their pieces on display. The instant gallery has so many interesting turnings, it will inspire you to try new techniques. It is always a popular gathering place in between demonstrations where you will hear people discussing how pieces are made.



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Do you need more incentive? There will be a hands-on pen turning opportunity all day on Saturday, a Banquet on Saturday evening with an excellent meal followed by a lively and fun auction of excellent turnings, wood, and tools. A raffle where you could win a few hundred dollars of turning related items donated by vendors with the purchase of a \$5 ticket.



The largest woodturning symposium is definitely the AAW annual symposium. This year it will be held in Portland Oregon, and they typically have about 1500 attendees. These are excellent events, but it will cost you \$440 plus travel, hotel, and meal expenses. Compare that to \$295 for the Turn-On Chicago symposium and most CWT members can go home at night. I have spoken to many demonstrators that have attended our previous symposiums and it is common to hear that ours is one of the best organized symposiums they have attended.

Don't miss this unique opportunity. If you cannot commit to the full 3-days, there is an option to sign up for 1 or 2 days. Go to our symposium website to learn more about the topics offered and to sign up. www.turnonchicago.com.

Finally, do you realize that Turn-On! Chicago is

responsible for providing the funds needed to keep our clubs membership dues as low as they are. Our club has so much to offer, monthly meeting with turning demonstrations with excellent AV equipment, a training center with 8 full size lathes and tools that every member can use, training classes 3-4 times a year from professional turners, a holiday party, community outreach activities, and much more.

Open Shop at the Chicago School of Woodworking

As part of our partnership with the Chicago School of Woodworking, no fee Open Shop Days will continue to be available to the members of the Chicago Woodturners on the last Sunday of the month Open Shop Days provide our members with access to all our shared equipment and tools as well as incidental (or prearranged) mentoring. Each of the Shop Days has a facilitator/mentor on site.

The Chicago Woodturners has six JET 1642s, two JET 1224 mini's and three Powermatic 3520's in a dedicated turning area at the Chicago School of Woodworking. Turning tools are available, both from the school stock and the Chicago Woodturners lending library. Of course, all members are free to bring whatever tools and wood blanks they choose. 

Over the past twenty years the club has accumulated many interesting tools for members to use on a special project or just to try before investing. *One of the many benefits of membership.*











Frank's Turning a Sphere demo triggered all sorts of questions (as all Interactive Demos should.) Questions like "How perfect can a sphere be? "How many ways are there to turn sphere?

Circles and spheres have a mathematical perfection. But as a

physical object how close to perfection can you get?

It tuns out that some scientists have created a sphere from silicon. It weighs exactly one kilogram, its diameter determined by its purpose as the standard weight of a kilogram. Its dense surface eliminates the possibility of

weight variation due to a rough surface. A chunk of silicon this size is neither cheap or easy to turn.

Fortunately for us we can create spheres with more forgiving materials and levels of perfection. In every symposium different turners show their approach to turning a sphere.

Just Google "How ro Turn a Sphere!". There's a great YouTube video by Mike Nish at Craft Supplies. There's also techniques from Dave Springett on turning spheres as a basis for making the embedded Chinese Balls.

There are many mechanical jigs for turning spheres. The one from Carter Tools is named "The Perfect Sphere." The video makes it look remarkably easy. It doesn't need to create an enclosed octagon or hexadecagon.

And lastly, there are articles on the AAW website, members have posted articles for turning spheres.

As the saying goes, "There are more than one way to skin a cat." Go out and try turning a few spheres, and try different ways to see what suits your skill level, your temperament and your needs.

Who is Soren Berger?

One name kept popping up in discussions and research about making spheres. Like Ayn Rand's John Gault in, "Atlas Shrugged", he's a mysterious artisan and an expert in turning spheres. Even Frank has a pair of Soren Berger Sphere Calipers. It's a very cool looking device. Kind of like a Golden Means caliper. Dick says he helped pioneer the concept of enclosing a sphere in a polygon.

The caliper is for the math challenged. But finding more on him is not easy. Search for him on the AAW website and interesting





stories come up. Search for him in Google and you'll find a nice YouTube video. His website is not working, but there is a Facebook page. www.facebook.com/woodturning.

I leave you to find out more about Soren Berger. Maybe Rich can get him to Chicago for TOC!
