Happy New Year. I just finished my first term as your President. Our Club has had a busy year in 2024. 2025 is shaping up as another fun filled woodturning year for the members of the Chicago Woodturners.

During 2024 we moved our meeting site to the Arlington Heights Senior Center. The Senior Center is a great improvement over our previous meeting site. We had in person demonstrations and classes from Graham Priddle and Melissa Engler, Roberto Ferrer, Nick Agar, Clint Stevens and Elizabeth Weber. The Club sponsored Beginning Spindle and Bowl Turning classes were fully subscribed. Our Past President, Andy Kuby, has been leading our last Sunday of the month Open Shop Day and Steve Glass is leading the Open Shop evenings on the first and third Thursdays of the month. We sponsored two Empty Bowl events that raised over \$4,000 for local food pantries; and we sent over 500 pens to the Pens for Troops organization. We had two pen turning events with the high schoolers. The Midwest Pen Gathering had a number of CWT members demonstrating and volunteering. Several members of the club have made Beads of Courage boxes and Wig Stands for cancer survivors.

Turn on Chicago 2024 was an educational and financial success for the club. We had six international demonstrators as well as several local demonstrators, Instant Gallery, banquet and auction. Our thanks to Al and Kurt and all of the volunteers for leading an excellent Symposium.

During our election in November, I was reelected as President for a two-year term. Rich Piper was elected as Secretary, but then Michael Canfield resigned as Treasurer due to health



reasons and Rich Piper volunteered to take on the Treasurer position. Frank Pagura, former Secretary has volunteered to stay on as Secretary until we find another member to take over the position. Please talk to me or Frank Pagura if you are interested before we start making phone calls to find a "volunteer". Your Board has three guys named Rich serving on it and one guy named Andy and another named Frank.

Rich Nye has scheduled several nationally known demonstrators to demonstrate at our monthly meeting and hold Hands-On Classes. He is finalizing those dates, but so far Rich has secured commitments from Matt Monaco, Donna Zils Banfield and Pat Carroll. Rich will discuss at our January meeting. He is working on two more demonstrators to round out our Hands-On Classes schedule for the year.

discarded Christmas trees. Later that day, my efforts yielded six very rough pine blanks. One of my precious turning tools was free of its handle.

By the grace of the Almighty and plenty of sixty grit sandpaper, I produced two somewhat cylindrical pieces that I proudly put in the front window of my studio. A fellow came into the studio thinking that my work looked somewhat phallic. We came to terms at \$15 per turning and he walked away happily. I thought that this might be the beginning of something special.

Later that week, I was at Woodcraft to replace my broken gouge. The clerk promised to help me, once he stopped laughing. He suggested that I attend the January meeting of the Chicago Woodturners, that very evening. That turned out to be wonderful advice.

There is no substitute for hands-on learning from an experienced turner.

If you are reading this newsletter, you may already be a member of the Chicago Woodturners. Every month we have the opportunity to learn a wide variety of techniques from accomplished woodturners. In a search for instruction, many attempt to learn from YouTube videos.

There are potential problems relying on this to be your primary instructional source. First, it's hard to know the quality of advice from these videos. Some are professionally produced by people with decades of experience in technique and safety. Other videos are unvetted horror shows.

If a video demonstrates how to turn a bowl with a spindle roughing gouge and the demonstrator is NOT wearing safety glasses, stop the video. If the video makes the hair on the back of your neck stand on edge, take it as a lesson in what not to do. There are many sources of great videos available from the American Association of Woodturners (woodturner.org) and Craft Supplies USA (woodturnerscatalog.com).

Secondly, learning from videos can be well and good, but even at its best, it's like learning martial arts by watching old Bruce Lee movies. *There is no substitute for hands-on*



learning from an experienced turner.

As it happens, the Chicago Woodturners (CWT) is a great source for instruction. In addition to monthly meetings, we have Open Shop time at the Chicago School of Woodworking. Even if you don't own a lathe or turning tools, you'll have access to them. Members are welcome to sign up, bring projects and have experienced mentors to assist.

So if you are a new turner, or a 'new turner' with years of practice, you are in the right place. We have the tools, the facilities and enthusiastic mentors who will be happy to help you improve your cuts.

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MAKE A MULTIGENERATION LAMINATION

chapter challenge is an excellent way to encourage members to try a new technique, and the Segmented Woodturners Chapter recently completed one titled, "Multigeneration Laminations." If you want your friends to ask, "How did you do that?" give it a try. It's a segmenting technique that requires precision cuts but results in very interesting patterns. A first-generation lamination always results in a zigzag pattern and is relatively easy to accomplish. If you decide to further test your skills, the results from second-generation laminations are stunning, and

the variety of patterns you can create is endless. The photos in the gallery immediately following this article show the variety of designs submitted by the chapter members.

Detailed steps for making a zigzag pattern are discussed in this article. And for the more ambitious, I will touch on making second- and thirdgenration laminations.

The lamination

A lamination is the gluing of multiple strips of wood of different species to achieve a desired pattern. Typically, the two outside strips provide a contrasting color as a

barrier. There can be one or more inside strips that create the desired pattern. In most cases, it is best to select woods with contrasting colors to accentuate the pattern. Use a PVA (polyvinyl acetate) glue such as Titebond and plenty of clamps when gluing up the lamination.

A typical lamination



Laminating woods of different species offers the opportunity to frame, or highlight, certain woods and to achieve a desired pattern.

Cut safely and accurately



The author uses a Wedgie Sled (shown at left) to cut a lamination at a 30-degree angle. At right is a stop, which ensures all of the pieces are of identical size.

Glue segments into a zigzag pattern



Glue the cut pairs into a single zigzag, also called a chevron.

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Open Shop at the Chicago School of Woodworking

As part of our partnership with the Chicago School of Woodworking, no fee Open Shop Days will continue to be available to the members of the Chicago Woodturners on **the last Sunday of the month, 9:00 am to 3:00 pm**. Open Shop Days provide our members with access to all our shared equipment and tools as well as incidental (or prearranged) mentoring. Each of the Shop Days has a facilitator/mentor on site.

The Chicago Woodturners has six JET 1642s, two JET 1224 mini's and three Powermatic 3520's in a dedicated turning area at the Chicago School of Woodworking. Turning tools are available, both from the school stock and the Chicago Woodturners lending library.

Of course, all members are free to bring whatever tools and wood blanks they choose. Two slow-speed grinders, with a variety of aluminum oxide/CBN wheels and Wolverine Jigs, are available.


